What a whirlwind year it has been! As you know, the Center purchased the building it had called home for the last 13 years, and the board has been diligently making improvements. Center volunteers and staff are pretty excited, as am I, as we now have a parking lot nearly triple in size, vertical storage for another 48 pallets of food and supplies, and additional improvements that make serving easier and more efficient.

This past year, we've also been planning the Center's long-term goals to serve the community. We always ask and investigate first when expanding, as good intentions are never enough when it comes to social service. I have watched this plan come together, I am even more grateful and honored to be a part of the Center's work every day, year, and decade.

Do you have ideas about what the Center could do to assist the community in the future? Partnerships that make great sense? Services that are direly needed? Ways to do anything better? I welcome any and all suggestions as we squarely follow the community leads.

In early January, watch for the Center's Growth Campaign launch as we begin implementing our long-range goals that will be both functional and beautiful, here as a part of the rural Kenosha County landscape. This expansion excites me, as I know these improvements will bring relief and support to families seeking ways to become self-sufficient and healthy in mind and body.

This year was similar to last: record high numbers in nearly all services we provide. With you, so far, we have met the need this year, whether you provided financial support, volunteered, or donated food or goods, and I thank you all immensely.

Now, at year-end and the holiday season, we again anticipate a record breaker, as food prices are still a challenge for families who live paycheck to paycheck or for folks on fixed incomes who can no longer make ends meet. We've seen a stark increase in homeless families with newborns and small children and seniors nearing 80 years old. When I say 'struggle to make ends meet', these are the scenarios we see every single day. Increased rent and lack of housing stock are spiking homelessness overall. It's a 'rock and hard' place for sure.

Yet, our job is to hold hope, among all the other things we do. We advocate, encourage, and provide a listening ear when life is too tough to weather alone. It's part of the exceptional service we strive to deliver to the ~5000 who reach us annually for help or direction.

So, as we head into the holiday season, in a world in turmoil from natural disaster and war, we recognize those in dire need, and bow to those in service across the globe.

May this holiday season be one of gratitude, joy, and togetherness. Thank you for your service and wish you a most abundant holy season and a bright new year.

As an essential part of our team, this motley crew of misfits help ease tension, reduce stress, create smiles, and provide laughter.


Juniper is the most compassionate and caring of the bunch. He waits impatiently to be petted, loves to be the center of attention, and soaks up all the belly rubs.

FINDING HOUSING IN A HOUSING SHORTAGE

Providing safe and affordable housing is a priority as the need for



companies, housing authorities, and Community Action Agencies spanning

several neighboring counties and states. We determine each circumstance's best course of action through a comprehensive needs assessment, increasing a family's self-sustainability. To date, we are proud to have assisted 72 critical cases in obtaining long-term housing and accessing housing-supportive programs.

FFORDABLE HOUSIN

The Sharing Center offers assistance not only to Kenosha County residents but also to our furry friends. In 2024 alone, we assisted over 470 cats and dogs with over 3000 pounds of food, health supplies, and toys. To ensure the safety and well-being of local pets, the Center partners with Noah's Rest, an organization dedicated to helping those escaping domestic violence with long and short-term pet



fostering. The Center participated in the annual PawTy In The Park event, raising awareness for animal adoption and health for animals of all kinds. Many of our volunteers donate their time locally to The Big Barn Animal Rescue. We donated unusable furs to Nebraska's Wildlife Rescue Team Inc., which uses the furs to rehabilitate injured, orphaned, and rescued wildlife.

SCHOOL SUPPLIES FOR SUCCESS

During this Back-to-School season, the Center served 367 children with new clothes & shoes and backpacks filled with school supplies.

BEAUTIFICATION HAS BEGUN

The Center has recently undergone renovations to make us more efficient, inviting, and accessible to the community. A huge thanks to the following people and partners who have helped make it happen: KAS Roofing added our beautiful new front roof, Westosha Lakes Church repaired and painted our garage, and A.M. Woodland Outdoor Designs and Harpster Lawncare transformed our landscaping. More thanks to Bristol Pallet and volunteer Ed Bochat, who refreshed our Boy Scout can collection container, Advanced Tree & Stump Removal for their expert tree care, and volunteer Mike Edwards for power washing the building until it shined. And our most noticeable improvement to Willis Dirt Works and Cicchini Asphalt, who nearly tripled our parking capacity.

Inside, Southeastern Wisconsin Building Trades expertly installed pallet racking, allowing us to store 48 additional pallets of food to meet the growing need. Plumbers & Steamfitters Local 118 and Karlsen Plumbing were responsible for quickly installing our new hot water heater, and our bathroom received a fresh coat of paint courtesy of our volunteer, Paul. To all those mentioned and more, your collective contributions and support of our mission are greatly appreciated, and we are excited to see the positive impact these improvements will bring!
